Dragonflies & Damselflies as Seen Through a Macro Lens

As Louis Pasteur said "The role of the infinitely small is infinitely great". Come explore the Lilliputian world of insects in this macro-photographic journey that takes you into the private lives of one of the most successful groups of insects to ever inhabit the planet earth - the Odonates (dragonflies and damselflies). Unravel the micro-mysteries

of their life cycle and behaviors. See how a camera lens can bring the world of the infinitely small alive with depth and textures that are seldom fully appreciated by the unaided human eye.

Speaker's Background Information: Marla Garrison is a biology faculty member at McHenry County College where she teaches Anatomy & Physiology and Microbiology. She has taught at the community college level for 20 years. She received a B.A. in chemistry at North Central College and an M.S. in molecular microbiology at Illinois State University. Over the past twelve years at MCC she has served as the president of the IACCB (Illinois Association of Community College Biologists), sat on the board of the Butterfly Monitoring Network; worked with the Dragonfly Monitoring Network; conducted research on butterfly genetics at the Chicago Academy of Sciences; carried out natural area restoration work with the support of the McHenry County Conservation Foundation; worked with the McHenry County Conservation District to conduct the first comprehensive dragonfly survey in the county; bred and reared butterflies in captivity for a living exhibit at the college; and, monitored Boone Creek Fen, an Illinois Nature Preserve. She is an active member of the Dragonfly Society of the Americas and The Great Lakes Odonata Meeting. Currently, she

volunteers working on the federal Hine's Emerald Dragonfly Project directed by the Illinois State Museum, and conducts dragonfly surveys within Illinois. For the past decade she has been utilizing macro photography to produce educational materials for her students as well as for identification and taxonomic purposes in the field. Her photography has been on display at the Columbus Zoo, Morton Arboretum, and the Peggy Notebaert Nature Museum. The culmination of her time spent in the field with her camera led to a sabbatical that allowed her to create and write a photo field guide entitled Damselflies of Chicagoland - the first in a series of local area field guides to support monitoring efforts in Illinois. The guide was published online by the Chicago Field Museum of Natural History and is available at the following website: http://fm2.fieldmuseum.org/plantguides/damsel-Volume 2: Dragonflies of Chicagoland is currently underway.

Special Evening at Mayslake June 17, 2013

Many of you may not be aware of the history of the property where we hold our meetings.

Construction of Mayslake Hall was completed in 1921. The owner, Francis S. Peabody, was a prominent Chicagoan and the founder of the Peabody Coal Company. The 39-room mansion was designed by Benjamin H. Marshall of the architectural firm Marshall & Fox who also designed the Blackstone, Drake and Edgewater Beach Hotels in Chicago. The building is an outstanding example of the Tudor Revival style of architecture popular at the time. This was to be the family's country retreat set on 900-acres in Chicago's western suburbs. The property was named after Peabody's wife and daughter, both named May.

Following Peabody's death in 1922, his heirs sold the property to the Franciscan Order of Friars Minor who used the property as a retreat house. The Portiuncula Chapel, a replica of the Chapel of St. Francis in Assisi, Italy, was built in 1926 as a memorial to Mr. F.S. Peabody. Over the years, much of the land around the house was sold for development and an addition of a large chapel and retreat rooms was built in the 1950's.

After the Franciscans decided to sell the remaining 87-acres by the late 80's, a campaign to save the property from further development resulted in its acquisition by the DuPage County Forest Preserve District in 1992. Since that time it has served as one of the education centers of the FPD-DC. Mayslake Hall is now listed on the National Register of Historic Places and is undergoing restoration. Today, the mansion hosts numerous cultural and educational programs as well as social events. The gardens around the building have been designed to represent the era, and the preserve surrounding the mansion includes wetlands, lakes, restored prairies and two small oak savannas.


On June 17, instead of our usual meeting, bring your camera equipment for a special evening at

Mayslake. Besides the usual access to the gardens and nature areas of the property, we will also have the opportunity for photography in a number of rooms within the mansion. You can arrive at any time to photograph outside. Access to the building for photography will begin at 6 p.m. and end at 9 p.m. Flash photography and tripods may be used.

Sign-in sheets and Information about the property will be available in our usual meeting area. We'll also have some snacks and beverages as well.

Following the event, we'd like to post some of your images on the Club website. Also, as a thank you to the Mayslake and Forest Preserve staff for hosting our regular meetings, we would like to provide some of our images from the evening event for their use in promoting the property. Any images used by the Forest Preserve District will show credit to the individual maker and to the Mayslake Nature Study and Photography Club. Mark your calendars and join us on June 17. This is the week of the longest day of the year so we're hoping for great light and a beautiful sunset.
